

Brief comments received

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1	WA already pay more GST contributions than all of Australia. We desperately need more GST to fix our critically ill hospital and health system, our schools are crumbling lacking the funding to fix them and infrastructure including house is desperately lacking.
2	As a Western Australian, I've seen first-hand the beneficial impact of the post-2018 fairer GST share for WA. You see so much building and development happening in Perth since then, which is great for jobs. I've also seen and used the newer Metronet train station developments, which are really useful for so many people, and I'm especially excited for my new Midland Station soon. WA deserves to keep the fair share, we contribute so so much to the national economy and Australia's wealth. That wealth should come back to us, and we deserve to have a fair proportion so that people here can have access to quality services like transport, roads, healthcare and schools as well.
3	GST revenue should be equally distributed between States and not used as a massive slush fund by incumbent Governments to secure votes and retain power. If the GST legislation allows this gross pork barrelling for a parochial State, then the loophole should be stitched closed. I stand for a fair Australia where all citizens share the wealth of the Nation, and not just those with the dumb luck to be sitting on massive deposits of natural resources. 6	Previous GST model led to huge budget deficits in WA and lack of investment in state economic development that hurt the national economy the 75% floor has allowed balance between providing services to growing population and investing in job creating industries and should remain corporate tax and income tax already provided for redistributing wealth to poorer State's
7	Draft brief comment (supporting WA's position) I support retaining the 2018 Goods and Services Tax (GST) distribution reforms in substance, including the 0.75 relativity floor, the new equalisation benchmark (to the fiscally strongest of New South Wales or Victoria), and the Commonwealth "top-up" arrangements. The pre-reform system produced extreme swings that undermined credible State budget planning. Western Australia's (WA's) relativity fell as low as 0.3 in 2015–16, and volatility became a recognised policy problem in its own right. The stated intent of the 2018 reforms was a more stable and predictable revenue source for all jurisdictions while preserving the best features of Horizontal Fiscal Equalisation (HFE). WA is still not receiving a "windfall". WA represents about 11% of Australia's population but currently receives around 8.2% of the GST pool, and a reversion to pre-2018 settings is estimated to drive WA's share down to ~2%, materially reducing capacity to fund hospitals, schools and essential infrastructure. ([Western Australian Government][1]) WA is not seeking a larger share, only to keep the current distribution settings. ([Western Australian Government][1]) Concerns about impacts on other states are already addressed through Commonwealth-funded mechanisms (top-ups and "no worse off" payments), rather than taking GST from one state to give to another. ([ministers.treasury.gov.au][2]) Recommendation: keep the 2018 framework (at minimum, a floor comparable to the current level) and focus any further changes on transparency and fiscal sustainability, not reopening settings that restored predictability. 8	Each state has its own benefits, drawbacks and challenges. All states and territories have demonstrated on numerous occasions, that there is an 'us' and 'them' mentality. Let's consider for a moment, if WA was a poverty stricken state. Would the other states be extending their hands with offers of support and aid as eagerly as they hold out their hands to claim their fair share and what they believe they are entitled to?
9	W.A pushes well above its weight per capita and faces significant issues (housing, transport network upgrades) that require addressing to enable further mining expansion. Restricting GST share back to 2018s level threatens to cut the most productive states growth potential at a time where other states productivity is already falling.
10	The WA should not keep its 75% of GST. the current arrangement strip's billions from other states and forces the federal government to fund this through other means. This amount has risen from the initial estimates and is not affordable. WA is the richest state in Australia and is running a budget surplus. The GST is better directed towards poorer states, such as Tasmania and the NT, to assist all Australians in receiving good health care, support and education.
11	My comments are based on experience starting over 45 years ago initially in NSW Treasury, a NSW Treasurer's office and after 1995,as the main financial adviser on the State Budget to two NSW Premiers. 1. The general revenue assistance system between the Federal and State/Territory Governments

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	needs fundamental reform as it approaches its centenary. It is complex, perverse, costly and not fit for purpose in a modern economy requiring improved productivity. 2. In the 1980s, the Commission deemed Queensland a mendicant State gaining a higher funding share yet it cut taxes such as abolishing death duties forcing other States to follow. 3. Fast forward to now where Victoria, one of the two benchmark States is nonsensically deemed a mendicant State. 4. NSW once incurred a cut in its funding share due to higher stamp duty revenue from a property boom. Yet due to the system's lagged nature, this was received in the year where the State was to receive lower stamp duty revenue as the property boom had ended. Tax rises, spending cuts in key areas or deficits are the response tools. 5. NSW once was criticised for having too many bus stops without regard to topography or physical ability of the aged and disabled. 6. The WA deal-at a cost of nearly \$50 billion by 2030 is unsustainable and beyond its intent. 7. There have been other attempted fixes from the Feds from handing over payroll tax in the 1970s, income tax sharing under PM Fraser, the GST deal (with some State tax offsets). Ultimately, there needs to be a fairer, simpler, less costly, more certain system. 8. I recommend that federal general revenue payments be based on per capita funding with top up payments to South Australia, Tasmania and the N.T. Such a reform could be phased in over say three years.
12	I don't believe WA should receive less than other states. We provide plenty and should get our fair share.
13	I am a sole trader, a father of two children under three, and the partner of a full-time stay-at-home parent in WA. The 75% GST relativity floor is important to my family because it supports funding for essential services such as hospitals, child health services, schools, and local infrastructure. These are services our family relies on every day. While GST reforms do not directly affect how much GST I pay as a sole trader, they strongly affect the State's ability to fund services without increasing costs for families through higher state taxes or reduced services. If WA's GST share were reduced, it would put pressure on the State budget and risk cuts to services or higher charges for households like mine. For single-income families with young children, this would increase cost-of-living pressure. I support retaining the current GST arrangements and the 75% per-person floor to protect families, small businesses, and communities across Western Australia.
14	WA deserves to retain a fair share of its GST.
15	Stop contemplating taking more than 25% of the GST paid by Western Australia businesses and individuals to distribute to other States and Territories. I personally would have drawn the line at 1/5 not 1/4.
16	WA receives the lowest percentage of the GST, but we look after a third of the territory of Australia. This means that we need to have adequate schooling, health care, infrastructure for a territory which is a third of the whole of Australia. If the Federal Government chooses to reduce our share of GST this will affect the hospitals, the schools, the roads, the trains and the various other programs that the State Government runs. This is simply unfair to the people of WA and will negatively affect every single one of us!
17	If the west Australian government believes its fair to receive 75% per person of GST revenue. Does it also believe that its residents should be able to keep 75% of their incomes earned instead of paying a majority of it towards GST, income and other goods excise taxes?
18	WA SHOULD KEEP 80% not just 75% And people working harder to earn more should not be penalised by higher income tax for little Jessica that choose to stay on Centrelink. Furthermore, if both adults are working and therefore paying more income tax, we should have an automatic 50% of all Daycare charges. Saying that there is a guaranteed three days subsidy doesn't help when the subsidy amount is not worth it to work more. We are getting taxed left

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	right and centre after working longer hours and people that cannot be bothered to work or get qualifications. Get the gas companies to pay their royalties and have little Jessica do a trade to ensure we don't have a short skills and labour supply. Use royalty to also help the homeless, dental on Medicare and stay at home mum's. Those royalties could probably pay for W.A. University fees for citizens. The most gas, but WE are getting the least amount of benefits. Take a look at SAUDI AND NORWAY.
19	I ask the Federal Government to give serious consideration to increasing Western Australia's share of GST funding. WA continues to be a major economic driver for the nation, contributing a disproportionately high share of Australia's export income and national revenue. Despite this, Western Australia remains at the lower end of GST receipts on a per capita basis. WA's mining, energy and agricultural sectors underpin national prosperity, and the infrastructure, workforce and services required to sustain this contribution come at significant cost to the State. A more equitable GST allocation would recognise the role WA plays in supporting the national economy and ensure the State has the capacity to continue delivering essential services, building infrastructure and generating long term economic value for all Australians. A fairer GST share would not only support the needs of a rapidly growing population but also strengthen national economic resilience. I ask the Commonwealth to ensure the distribution model adequately reflects these realities and provides Western Australia with a level of funding commensurate with its contribution to the nation.
20	It only makes sense that the largest contributor to the county's GST get a fair share of it to better fund the state and its needs to cater for the many people who call WA home and to those will call it home in the future. WA isn't asking for a bigger chunk than any other state but we're asking for an even chunk with other states. WA is the largest state in the country and largest contributor to the country's GST and yet get a measly amount of GST. MAKE IT MAKE SENSE?
21	I have personally seen the egregious levels of waste and lack of work by those in WA especially in the public sector. They do nothing. They spend far too much because they have too much. 29	Please leave 0.75 of GST for WA as per agreement in 2018
30	Western Australians work hard and contribute strongly to the national economy, and it's only fair that a reasonable share of the GST generated here comes back to support the communities that created it. From the Pilbara to Perth, local businesses, families and industries drive economic activity that feeds into the national GST pool. When too much of that revenue flows elsewhere, it can feel like WA is carrying a bigger load while still needing to fund vast regional infrastructure, hospitals, schools and essential services across the largest state in the country. 40	I am a West Australian Pharmacist and believe the GST unfairly advantages WA and needs reform. The Commonwealth Grants Commission distributes GST and was established to ensure that each state was able to provide services to its people at comparable levels. This is no longer happening. The GST Distribution Reforms of 2018 have resulted in the wealthy WA government earning significant royalty flows as well as a very large GST share. It has robust finances compared to other states and so is able to provide better services. Compare this to Tasmania where health and education services are under severe strain and the state is heavily in debt and has limited revenue sources. Its health and education outcomes lag well behind the rest of the nation. I do not know what reforms to the current system would work best but I know reform is needed if we are to adhere to the basic premise of the Grants Commission – adequate funding to the poorer states to bring them to the standard of the wealthy states. WA used to be a recipient of increased funding for many years. It is now time for WA to contribute more.

46	Just because other states spend big and can’t pay off their debt doesn’t mean WA should take a hit. They need to handle their finances better!! We pay our share just as much as the rest of Australia if not more, why should we miss out because of their mismanagement!
47	One of the criteria used to assess a states ability to raise revenue is property values. From the Grants Commission web site: "Property prices affect the ability to raise revenue from conveyancing and land taxes. States with relatively higher property prices have a greater capacity to raise revenue from these taxes." In my view, this is incorrect. The ability to raise revenue ultimately depends on the ability of the tax payer to pay the tax. For example, a first home buyer in Sydney may be paying a lot for the property. But it does not follow that they have a greater capacity to pay property related taxes (in absolute dollars) then a person in a state with lower property values. Also, a state with lower property values could potentially raise equivalent revenue through a higher percentage rate applied to the lower property value. Indeed, people may have a greater capacity to pay a certain amount in taxes if the value of the property they are buying is lower.

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48	Will this review consider whether gambling taxes should be included when assessing the fairness of any GST splits between states? To me that is critical as without it a warped picture is presented.
49	We, the people of Western Australia, pay a large amount of money to the Australian Federal Government, in the form of the Goods and Services Tax (GST). We, the people of Western Australia, deserve to receive a fair share of the GST, from the Australian Federal Government, in return.
50	Don't change the GST and take from WA! We need to keep our fair share
51	The arrangements for WA made by Scott Morrison have seen a disastrous attack on the fairness of the system for all Australians and makes a mockery of the horizontal fiscal equalisation principle. We need simplicity, certainty and transparency with these arrangements. An equal per capita measure with direct top up grants to those jurisdictions who need it is a better model. An Equal per capita model has merit as it will provide this while still redistributing some funding from relatively higher performing states to others.
52	Need versus want we don't need a bigger share of GST we get enough \$. through mining one day that will dry up and then we will need more GST \$
53	The 2018 GST reforms have provided Western Australia with greater certainty and a fairer share of GST revenue. It is important that the current arrangements, including WA's GST floor, are maintained and not unwound through this review. Any future reforms should provide certainty and stability for all jurisdictions while ensuring Western Australia is not disadvantaged by a return to the previous distribution arrangements.
54	Whilst I've only had time to read your media release and some other brief commentary I can't say I'm surprised at this attack on Western Australians and businesses here, we've been punished by this system before whilst other States have been able to sail through with hardly a care in the world. The system was flawed as soon as it was created, well before 2018 changes. How any Australian could possibly believe it's fair that WA only gets circa 30c in the dollar of GST collected whilst others wasteful spending on failed Commonwealth Games bids, unnecessary Olympic Games, massive union construction rorts, failed /cancelled infrastructure projects or the fact pokie/gaming revenues are excluded from calculations all doesn't impact considerations, is bemusing. It's well past time for those States to take a long hard look in the mirror and to be more responsible.
55	I'm a public servant working in social housing delivery. A reduction in GST allocation would almost definitely lead to a quick and ongoing reduction in funding to my Department and subsequently a reduction to social housing delivery in Western Australia. It's not all racetracks and Italian soccer tournaments over here
56	As a Western Australian resident, I strongly urge the Commission to recommend retaining the 75% GST floor. Before 2018, WA's GST return plummeted to under 30 cents per dollar, unfairly penalizing our state while we funded critical infrastructure to drive Australia's export economy and federal corporate tax revenue. The 75% floor provides vital fiscal certainty for WA to maintain healthcare, education, and roads amid global commodity price swings. Reverting to the pre-2018 system would undermine economic fairness and harm WA families. Please keep the 75% GST floor to ensure a stable and fair arrangement for all Australians.
57	Leave our GST as it is we are a big state who mines our minerals not just leave them in the ground
58	Keep what WA deserve to maintain and improve our health, education and infrastucture for future generation.

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59	Why isn't pokies revenue included in the states' revenues upon which the determination is made on GST distribution?
60	No 75 percent guarantee/no vote for Labour
61	Firstly I would insist that Mr Albanese sticks to his word and maintains the 75 cents minimum for WA. Saying that WA will get its "Fair Share" is not a guarantee, especially given his backtracking on other promises. Secondly when are the gambling taxes paid to other state governments, especially NSW and Victoria (around \$3 billion) going to be acknowledged in the GST calculations. Thirdly why are other states, especially Victoria, not penalised for shutting down or not developing their own resources. WA has to provide extensive road, port, power and other infrastructure over a massive distance/area to allow for the resources development that provides so much productivity and generates income for the rest of Australia.
62	I am a Western Australian, and while I do not necessarily support the current GST arrangements, especially in terms of their effect on the federal budget, I do think that the Productivity Commission should consider the following issues before making recommendations to change the GST distribution formula: 1. Other states' access to income from poker machines which are heavily restricted in WA. 2. Other states wasting funds on political projects like the stadium in Hobart when that state claims to need a higher proportion of the GST for basic infrastructure like hospitals and education; the Brisbane Olympic Games stadium, rowing and whitewater facilities when existing facilities would have been adequate; Victorian and Queensland major construction corruption; Sydney Powerhouse museum and ANZ stadium rebuild; etc. etc. 3. Why is just the GST involved in your deliberations, when the income tax and corporation tax arrangements involve much greater sums and should also be used to subsidise those states which do not have the opportunity to generate wealth through natural advantages? 4. Why are you not looking at reducing or eliminating the diesel fuel rebate for mining companies, and asking why they are not electrifying their transport? 5. Why are you not looking at a tax on gas companies exporting their product to other countries which then onsell it? 6. Why are you not looking at an increase in the GST. If a majority of states think the current system is unfair, then surely they would support an increase in the rate to something approximating what is normal in other parts of the world?
63	Unwinding 2018 gst reforms will just circle back to reform gst share again once it fails WA needs. A more realistic approach is needed with each states costs spends and assessments carefully reviewed. Poor spend management should also be penalised and retracted from allowable gst share in all states and territories. Clear definitions required.
64	I believe WA should receive 75% of the Goods and Services Tax. To have their fair share of it.

66	HFE should benchmark each state against the highest sustainable and comparable revenue effort achieved by any state, applied to the states own realistic tax and resource base. 73	Western Australians have been fighting for our fair share of the GST for longer than I've been alive — leave our shares alone!
74	WA needs to either remain at the same rate or increase. Population increases, net 0, live export stop, usa taffies etc we need a fair go
75	Please keep WA's GST share at the current level. We are using ng you t for vital infrastructure projects that will boost our economy and make us more climate change resistant for the next century.
76	I oppose these changes which will unfairly impact WA.
77	You should include the income all states receive from poker machines in your calculations. Poker machines are banned in WA. WA only receives a small amount of poker machine revenue from our casino, the only place permitted to use poker machines, but the other states generate huge amounts of poker machine revenue.
78	We live in Tasmania - stuck with a Liberal government. Is this why Mr Albanese won't play fair with us? We always voted Labour in the past; but our Labour representatives are Liberal clones on most of the issues we are facing here. It looks like Independents and The Greens are the only ones listening and seeing what is happening to Tassie.

82	The population of Western Australia is roughly equivalent to the population of Western Sydney. The state of WA would therefore contribute bugger all in terms of GST revenue by comparison to the eastern states. WA rapes its landscape on a grand scale to generate itself mining royalties which it does not share with the rest of the states in the federation. It therefore follows that the share of GST revenue WA currently receives is over generous and a gross inequity. It must be scaled back.
83	Agree with the recommendations of the interim report. It is important to address the dominant state effect as this impacts delivering the best outcomes for all people of Australia. It is also imperative to address mining in the creation of the dominant state and revenue. The natural environment should be the main priority, along with the wellbeing of the nation, a good approach would be to look at the how Buthan has their GDP index based on holistic approach to measure the happiness and wellbeing of the Bhutanese population, rather than productivity.
84	I was disappointed to see the Productivity Commission recommending that WA not continue to receive a minumum share of its GST take. The GST equalisation system is broken. It is complicated, political, unfair and out of date in many of its criteria. The whole thing inevitably becomes political, arbitrary and subject to interpretation, like most high minded edicts. The Productivity Commission should be focused on simplifying and improving the GST equalisation system and ensuring that it is rewarding productive versus unproductive state behaviour. WA is a well-run and productive state with relatively high infrastructure and wage costs that go with such productivity. New South Wales (another relatively productive state) is screaming blue murder when its GST take falls below 95% and yet WA is told that it is an outrage that it isn't reduced to 20%. We can all see the double standards here. When the GST was first introduced and voters were asked to sanction it in a federal election, we were told that the states would keep their GST take. That was a promise and an understanding right from the beginning. I'm pretty sure that didn't mean some states would get to keep all of another state's GST take! The states actually own their resources and should encourage and assist the exploitation of their resources (in a responsible and environmentally appropriate way) for the benefit of the state and the nation. From an Australian Constitution and state's rights point of view requiring that resource royalties automatically belong to the poorest states is coming from the wrong position in the first place. The federal government is in a position to provide additional targetted funding to the poorer states to assist them and this already occurs in very large measure, no one is arguing against this. Automating a large fiscal transfer from a productive state to an unproductive state is simply encouraging and entrenching the unproductive states to stay that way. It fails to reward or incentivise the productivity settings or recognise the additional costs of the productive state. From a fairness and productivity point of view this doesn't make sense and it shows that the Productivity Commission has become politicised and engaged in a federal funding and state's rights debate rather than in a productivity debate.
85	I worked for 33 years for BHPIO both as a residential and FIFO mechanic. In my last FIFO job, 10 out of the 15 people on the shift were from the eastern states, flying back to Port Hedland with tales of money spent on home improvements, 4x4 modifications, realestate, holiday or big boy toy purchases. So, my point is, these workers from the east, fly in, spend not one dollar in WA as all the transport, meals and accomodation are supplied and then fly home and spend their dollars in the eastern states, creating GST credits for those states. I worked with one person from NSW who was that determined not to

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	spend anything that he would take fill an empty water bottle with locomotive degreaser and use it to wash his work clothes rather than purchase washing product from the accomodation facility shop. He got his clothes clean but it wasnt good for his skin when he sweated in the Pilbara heat.
86	It's is only fair that as Australians we all get our fair share of the GST. We are a growing state and with this comes a need to have the revenue to build the required infrastructure. Other states are responsible for working within their budgets instead of trying to reduce our share of the GST. Whether it be State, Business and home owners to be successful we all live with a budget. Thank you
87	I support retaining the current 2018 GST distribution reforms and ensuring Western Australia keeps a fairer share of the GST it generates. Western Australia makes a major contribution to Australia's economy through mining, exports, jobs and taxation. At the same time, WA faces significant costs in providing hospitals, schools, roads, power and other services across a vast area, including regional and remote communities. The previous system unfairly penalized WA for growing its economy and generating royalty revenue. Returning to that system could seriously reduce funding available for essential services and infrastructure in Western Australia. I support improvements that ensure other states can provide comparable public services, but these should not come at the expense of WA's ability to meet its own needs or continue contributing to the national economy. The GST system should recognize WA's geographic challenges, infrastructure responsibilities and contribution to Australia. Please retain the current GST arrangements and ensure Western Australia receives a fair and sustainable share of GST revenue.
88	In western Australia a great deal of the government's income is derived from mineral royalties. Other states do have mineral deposits but they value their environments more. That is fine but there is an economic cost to them. This is greatest in Tasmania and the NT. Economic realities are a brutal unavoidable way of distributing wealth. The tax cuts made by the Howard government could also be targeted to identify Australia's current deficit and to explain why some states are now short on cash.
89	WA isn't asking for extra GST. It's asking not to be punished for carrying the nation! Keep the 2018 deal: 1. Without it WA drops from 82¢ in the dollar to 24¢ — ~\$6bn a year. No other state has ever been sent that low. 2. WA is 11% of the population, 17% of the economy and 45%+ of goods exports — yet gets 9% of GST (2.7% without the deal). 3. Even with the floor, WA still subsidises the rest of Australia by ~\$2bn a year in GST. Since 2000: \$50bn+. 4. Full equalisation clawed back ~89¢ of every extra iron-ore/lithium royalty dollar. That's a tax on success. 5. \$6bn is WA's public schools — or the wages of its hospital staff. Cut that and you cut the ports, roads and energy that lift national exports. A strong WA funds Australia. Don't wreck the state!
90	What if you try to change the GST distribution and then WA decides to secede, then the eastern states will end up with no GST.
