


Last year I finished High School at Belmont High. The NDIS helped me do VCAL. It was great! Here are some photos from my Year 12 graduation.





And here is a photo of my VCAL certificate. Mum and Dad were so proud!




After I graduated I went away for a week for schoolies with some friends – we made some cocktails, mostly green ones.


