Re: AUSTRALIA'S GAMBLING INDUSTRIES

Thank you very much for favouring me with a Copy of the Draft Report on the subject matter and which I have found to be most concise, hopefully something positive will eventuate in the not too distant future.

2. I take pleasure in enclosing herewith my contribution to the current debate which I trust you will find worthy of your consideration. At this juncture, the purpose of favouring you with a copy and enclosures of my letter basically to highlight the fact that despite the respective Statute Laws, Rules, Regulations Etc., the bureaucrats/bureaucracy do seem to 'turn a blind eye' when breaches of these afore-stated Rules & Regulations are brought to their attention. Example - within the enclosed, "Gaining Financial Advantages", "Publication of False and/or Misleading Information" are proof without any reasonable doubt accruing yet to this present ate, is still happening (DRAFT REPORT PAGE VII EXISTING SELF-REGULATORY ARRANGEMENT CAN BE INHERENTLY MISLEADING).

3. For information of the PRODUCTIVITY COMMISSION I am a Private "Community-Minded" citizen and likened to "NUMISMATICS", "PHILATELY" as a Hobby, I have "LOTTO" as mine. Since its ("LOTTO") introduction in NSW (5th NOVEMBER 1979) I have maintained numerous Statistical Data on ALL aspects and have frequently brought to the attention of appropriate authorities matters which I considered to be irregular practices and infringements of the NSW LOTTO ACT & REGULATIONS. Self praise is no Recommendation but, as a result of my actions, numerous changes did eventuate. The TRADE PRACTICES ACT 1974 encourages Fair Competition within the free enterprise system and protects Customers & Businesses from unfair practices. The Law ensures that a Corporation's Business Practices are based on Honesty ! Consumers are protected from "MISLEADING & DECEPTIVE CONDUCT AND UNCONSCIONABLE CONDUCT". Hence, close scrutiny of all matters outlined within my letters & enclosures attached hereto, does, in my opinion, prove beyond any reasonable doubt, that something is "WRONG" and any remedial action be taken to ensure that the integrity of "LEGAL" Form of Gambling is best left to an independent (NON GOVERNMENT) body.

4. May I cordially invite your attention (within the enclosed) to a letter received from the AUSTRALIAN BROADCASTING AUTHORITY of 16th AUGUST 1999 and perhaps the BROADCASTING SERVICES ACT 1992 would need to be amended. Furthermore, may I suggest is not already done, the Productivity Commission obtain and examine a copy of a NSW LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ARTICLE - titled - "GAMBLING (ANTI-GREED) ADVERTISING PROHIBITION BILL" which was introduced by the REV. FRED NILE, MLC which has had a Second Reading. This document although intended for NSW could be made the subject of FEDERAL GOVERNMENT consideration.

"G A M B L I N G"

The subject of "GAMBLING" does often raise heated arguments within the various factions of the community and it is a subject that Sociologists throughout the World cannot comprehend, nor are they able to explain as to why there is a need for people to "GAMBLE"

Let us first examine the word itself ! "GAMBLE" - is to play games of Chance in order to win money. Secondly, to risk or bet money etc on the outcome of an event, be it at a Game of Cards, a Sporting Event, Lottery or even Lotto and thirdly, to act with the expectation of returning more than the initial investment and finally, a risky act or venture.

Millions of people throughout the World try there "GAMBLING" at Horse Racing, Lotteries, Soccer Pools, Lotto and many other Forms of "GAMBLING" with the dawning of electronic technology (INTERNET) that is acceptable to the individuals cultural way of life. For example, within the Asian Countries, "COCK-FIGHTS"(Feather variety) is legal but within Australia thats considered to be illegal. The lure of a quick fortune is hard for many to resist, especially those living within the proximity of the proverbial poverty line or those with false ambitions of becoming Millionaires overnight.

"GAMBLING" is not confined to the individuals within the Community but it is also carried on in the Business Sectors. However, the word "GAMBLE" is substituted by the word "SPECULATION" in the Form of THE STOCK EXCHANGE. There have been many world famous Companies that have been known to have gone broke as a result of their bad "GAMBLE" (Investments).

Here in AUSTRALIA, be it a myth or a reality, there is a widespread belief that AUSTRALIANS would wager their last Dollar on a contest between two or more blow flies walking up a wall ! Theoretically, Australians as "GAMBLERS" rate within the top "FIVE" Nations of the World in the "GAMBLING" stakes and there are many who would argue that the "GAMBLING HABITS" can be likened to a contagious disease. There are others who would have us believe that "GAMBLING" is an addiction such as "DRINKING", "SMOKING" or the use of narcotic drugs. Then there are others who would believe that habitual "GAMBLERS" are the prime cause of Family Break-ups and the lowering of "Family Values" within our Society. The bureaucrats go out of their way to deter "SMOKERS", "DRINKERS" and "DRUG ADDICTS" but condone and encourage "GAMBLERS" in allowing the conducting of "LOTTO"/"OZ LOTTO"/"POWERBALL" on the Free to Air Public Broadcasting Television Networks

/ To bombard

To bombard one with the Statistics on the various aspects pertaining to "GAMBLING" would be a dull and/or perhaps monotonous exercise especially ~~when~~ numerous facts and figures are necessary in the collation of peoples "CHOICE" or "FORMS" of Gambling and the time spent in highlighting these statistics would be a distraction from the main topic of "GAMBLING".

"LADY LUCK" (often used in the "GAMBLING" vocabulary) was once regarded as a woman of style and mystique, has, in this present day of "COMPUTER" technology, been transformed into a greedy mechanical whore and with her talents as a money spinner, pandering to prevailing tastes and wanting that extra opportunity of boosting Bank Balances, Governments all around the world have adopted the role of a "MADAM" and put "LADY LUCK" out to work for them in various ways such as "Letterys", Lotte, Keno, Soccer Pools and Instant Scratchies'. The, of course, the "PIMPS" of "LADY LUCK" - the Registered Clubs, Casinos, Newsagents and others with their sophisticated Electronic Gadgetry lure individual humans into becoming "GAMBLERS". Logically, "LADY LUCK" plays no part when likened to ANY electronic controlled gadgetry.

"GAMBLING" be it on a small or large scale, is a major source of indirect Revenue for Government Coffers, yet, the main source of profit for the entrepreneurs and share holders of the Commercial Business which operate the "GAMBLING" Industry. It is a well known accepted fact as a journalist in the Australian Printed media once pointed out - "ALL GAMBLING" - certainly ALL/EGAL GAMBLING, is firstly designed to raise the input of revenue for the Government and only second to those who choose to "GAMBLE" and there is alot of truth within the Centuries old adage viz "THE RICH GET RICHER WHILST THE POOR GET POORER" because "GAMBLING" is much more than mere amusement. Its an escape from everyday routine, or a hopeful and wishful stab of riches. It is often regarded as an important, if not, essential part of the "GAMBLERS" life-style. Ask any "GAMBLER" why they Gamble and invariably they reply wou{d be " I enjoy the risk involved plus the fact that I was depressed and it cheers the inner self whenever I have a Winner "!. What the "GAMBLER" is unaware of, is the false outlook in becoming a Millionaire overnight - all those catchy jingles one hears on the Television in reference to the various Games of "LOTTO", flashing lights with the occassional clatter of cascading coins as seen and heard in Registered Clubs/Casinos' or the betting odds in sporting evens ~~are~~ bait being implanted in the minds of the "GAMBLER". Reminds one of a story about a habitual "GAMBLER" Who had lost his job as a Company Director, when questioned if he had ever considered giving up his addiction, coldly replied - "I COULDN'T DO THAT, IT'S MY LIKE"

/ What changes

What changes casual Gamblers into becoming compulsive ones ? The causes vary from individual to individual, but in one way or other, Gamblers arrive at a point in their lives when they cannot live without "GAMBLING". The Gambler keeps on Gambling regardless of how much they do loose. If they win, those winnings are invariably used in a follow-up Gamble as any player of the "POKIES" will tell you. The Gambler does constantly incur debts which leads to frantic borrowing be it from any Financial Institution, the Household Budget or Family Savings and sooner or later, acts of dishonesty creeps into their lives likened to the Drug addict. Family, friends and children become subservient to his GAMBLING. Their compulsion inevitably leads to strife with catastrophic results which statistics from the Family Law Courts could varify. The intense feeling of guilt makes the Gambler more introverted and the ability to relate to others becomes more difficult. Eventually, severe depression sets in and his final Gamble - that on his/her life, often takes its toll.

Many Gamblers are swayed by hunches rather than by logic. Simple mathematics should deter the Gambler plus the knowledge played by the "COMPUTER MECHANISM" should convince the Gambler that the odds are stacked against the individual. In the State of SOUTH AUSTRALIA the ODDS of winning any particular Prize is made Public knowledge - the figures are Printed on the reverse side of the Entry Coupon "POWERBALL" but, within NEW SOUTH WALES such is not to be found. Way back in 1891 CHARLES WELLS an English Gentleman visited the famous MONTE CARLO CASINO. Within a few days after his arrival, he converted TEN THOUSAND FRANCS into a MILLION and somewhat astonishingly he repeated the feat four months later. The following year, he passed on to greener pastures absolutely penniless. Nearly all Gamblers end up poorer than before they started Gambling. Even the few who do win large amounts (fortunes) find their winnings are not a Passport to happiness and more often than not, bring about the individuals change in life-style and their ultimate gamble is paid off by their lives.

"GAMBLING" can best be described as "ADOPTING THE PRINCIPLE - YOU'VE GOT TO BE IN IT TO WIN IT DESPITE THE ODDS" and once again invariably from the average class of individual Gamblers who are motivated by the slender chances of winning big for a small investment, theorising on the Laws of Chance, where-in over a Life-span, a mere 99.9% of GAMBLERS would attribute their success as a result of their Gambling addictions.

To give a better insight on the subject, one must first ask of themselves - "IS IT WORTH A GAMBLE" ? Using "LOTTO" as an example in answering that question, there are many within the community that subscribe

/((indulge) in this

(indulge) in this form of Gambling who are totally unaware of "FACTS" pertaining to the actual drawing of the respective NUMBERS. Their subscriptions are as a result of publicity attached to such Games of Chance and ofcourse their desires to becoming MILLIONAIRES overnight. Going back in time (MONDAY 5th NOVEMBER 1979) "LOTTO" presentations would be of approximately Half Hour duration, currently, a maximum of "FIVE" Minutes and the full sequence is NEVER seen during the TV presentations. Viewers are NOT aware that these "LOTTO" presentations are taped at Channel Nine's Willoughby studios as was made public knowledge in an Editorial Published within "THE SUN-HARALD MAGAZINE" (Page 11 - 7th MAY 1995). These individuals that participate in this Form of Gambling fail to take into consideration the ODDS against them and that its 'Pay-Out' structure is very finely tuned in the Governments favour and/or the Registered Company/Organization carrying on this Commercial Operation. This Registered Company/Organization is meticulously withheld from being made Public knowledge. Rules pertaining to the Conduct of Games of "LOTTO" are merely displayed at Newsagencys' and other outlets and members of the Public are NOT aware of the context of these Rules. The Rules, Official Results and frequent publicity fail to outline the identity of the Registered Company ?

Finally, to summarize, "GAMBLING" is all about seeking a reward more than ones outlay and there is nothing in this modern world of ours that can change Society's ways into believing that "LADY LUCK" is NOT alive. There is never any known Rules to "GAMBLING" even though there are some within the community who would suggest otherwise. There are individuals from all walks of "LIFE" who Gamble with their lives and there are few statistics that bring this to the Public's attention. To "GAMBLE" or "NOT TO GAMBLE" is the individuals own choice and for the individual to assess the "RIGHTS" or "WRONG" of "GAMBLING". There are Statuate Laws which prohibit Gambling in Public, other than within Registered Clubs/Casinos and certainly no such Statuate Laws which permits ANY Government to authorise and condone or to encourage "GAMBLING" via the Free to Air Television Broadcasting Networks. It is only logic to assume that on a National Population Scale, its a minority that are interested in this form (LOTTO) of "GAMBLING" which needs to be taken into consideration when addressing the methods of a "LEVEL PLAYING FIELD" in regards to "GAMBLING".

Dear Madam/Sir,

Re: GAMES OF CHANCE (GAMBLING)
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Having watched a Programme "7.30 REPORT" on the ABC Television on the subject of PRODUCTIVITY COMMISSION INQUIRY - 19th JULY, 1999 and having read various reports and comments within the printed media on the subject, has prompted me into once again raise my concerns on the subject matter which over the years have vigorously made written complaints to the appropriate authorities of the bureaucracy - only to have received negative responses on most occasions and on others NO RESPONSES AT ALL.

2. Most recently (21st APRIL 1999) I lodged an Official complaint addressed to:

- i. The Director-General., Dept of Gaming & Racing
- ii. The Hon. RICHARD FACE., MP., Minister responsible for Gaming/Racing
- iii. The Director-General (Mr. D.B. O'CONNOR) Dept of FAIR TRADING

and the only response received was a letter (FILE No. 98/3074 Pt 3 Dated 18th MAY 1999) from the Dept of FAIR TRADING - NSW Consumer Protection Agency PARRAMATTA advising me that the contents of my letter (21 APR 99) had been noted and that issues raised do not impact upon any legislation administered by the Minister for Fair Trading and are ones that could be more appropriately dealt with by the Department of Gaming & Racing. Needless to say I considered this response as being most unsatisfactory having sent the same letter (21 APR 99) to the afore-stated and to this day and time have received no acknowledgement nor response. Perhaps I should mention that I am of the opinion my concerns are being completely ignored by authorities because of the financial advantages obtained by the Government (NSW) as highlighted within the PRODUCTIVITY COMMISSION INQUIRY !

3. To elaborate my concerns in the written form to NEW ADDRESSEES would be too complicated for me as a lay-person, thus it is only to be hoped that upon close scrutiny of the enclosed, addressees will be able to comprehend the points I am attempting to obtain satisfactory answers and the need to have "WRONGS" rectified or eliminated. Basically, as confirmed within the PRODUCTIVITY COMMISSION INQUIRY, these GAMES OF CHANCE i.e. "LOTTO", "POWERBALL" and "OZ LOTTO" are within the category of GAMBLING and there is no statute laws which permit such to be conducted or encouraged via the television broadcasting networks ? These "Games of Chance" are primarily COMMERCIAL BUSINESS operations to the advantages of the REGISTERED COMPANY/ORGANISATION likened to "CASINOS" and current practices leave much to be desired - modern day electronic technology playing a big part in such operations and there is every possibility of "GAINING FINANCIAL ADVANTAGES BY DECEPTION" that needs to be examined.

4. Within the PRODUCTIVITY COMMISSION INQUIRY one reads "CONSUMER PROTECTION MEASURES" yet sadly after having brought matters to the attention of the NSW Director-General, Dept of FAIR TRADING, nothing further appears to have eventuated? One must not forget that BUSINESS CORPORATIONS conducting these "GAMES OF CHANCE" do have subscriptions made by the general public, yet their identification i.e. A.C.N. and/or other factors are NOT made Public knowledge. I have sighted documents held by the AUSTRALIAN SECURITIES COMMISSION thus know 'FACTS' than my peers and certainly can provide specific information should addressees require such.

5. In conclusion, I wish to inform ALL ADDRESSEES of the fact that I am a "COMMUNITY MINDED" Private Citizen and my actions are NOT (R)NOT one of "SOUR GRAPES" nor as indicated in a letter received many years ago from a Minister within the present NSW Government within which he alleges that I am a "VEXATIOUS" letter writer. I know from my "STATISTICS" that something is radically "WRONG" and that in everyday language have come to the conclusion that members of the Public are (those who subscribe to these "GAMES OF CHANCE") "NOT" being given a "FAIR GO" and such Games of Chance are "NOT" on a level playing field. I sincerely hope that with the present day debate on "GAMBLING" that somebody somewhere will heed my concerns and do something.

- (i) These are Commercial Business ventures which are subscribed to from members of the Public in general and logically the Public have the "RIGHT" to know facts:

- (a) The A.C.N./Registered Company(Corporation or person(s) conducting these 'Games of Chance'
- (b) The person(s) Name accepting full responsibility that Published Figures are authentic.

(ii) "OFFICIAL RESULTS" (MONDAYS' & MID WKS"

- Reference LOTTO RULES (AUGUST 1990) (Currently in force but theoretically and from legal aspects deemed to be obsolete)

1. Definitions:

- (jj) "Subscription" means the amount presscribed by the Minister excluding Commission, which a subscriber shall be charged to enter a Game of LOTTO.

Observations of Published "OFFICIAL RESULTS" - Subscriptions to Draw indicate "DOUBLE UP" amounts are included. "DOUBLE UP" monies is NOT a Subscription for a STANDARD/SYSTEMS Entry thus should not be included within SUBSCRIPTIONS TO PARTICULAR DRAW as DIVISIONAL PRIZE POOL FIGURES ARE BASED UPON THIS (SUBSCRIPTION TO DRAW) FIGURE !

- (iii) The current practice of Publishing only the SUBURB where Division 1 Winner(s) were sold is considered to be improper because these "OFFICIAL RESULTS" are NOT Published in other NEWSPAPERS other than THE SYDNEY MORNING HERALD/DAILY TELEGRAPH !

(iv) "OFFICIAL RESULTS" - OZ LOTTO

Frequent check of the MELBOURNE NEWSPAPERS fail to reveal such.

Observation of Division 1 Prize Pool Winner(s) merely shows :

EXAMPLE - WINNING ENTRY FROM WESTERN AUSTRALIA (Draw 243)
WINNING ENTRY FROM VICTORIA (Draw 244)

(v) "OFFICIAL RESULTS" - POWERBALL

EXAMPLE : WINNING ENTRY FROM NEW SOUTH WALES (Draw 123)
WINNING ENTRY FROM VICTORIA (Draw No. 103)
WINNING ENTRY FROM WESTERN AUSTRALIA (Draw No.95)

Average number of Draws with Large sums of money for Division 1 Winners (From 127 Draws) reveal Winners OUTSIDE NEW SOUTH WALES. ?

(vi) "OFFICIAL RESULTS" - SOCCER POOLS

SYDNEY MORNING HERALD/DAILY TELEGRAPH Publish "OFFICIAL RESULTS" for "LOTTO" "POWERBALL" "OZ LOTTO" but fail to Publish detailed Match Results from which WINNING NUMBERS are derived at !

- (vii) SUBSCRIPTIONS TO DRAW FIGURES ARE IN MINUTE(SMALL) PRINT which may be interpreted as being deceptive conduct.

LOTTO ACT 1979 No. 53 (Reprinted as at 6 September 1993)

Definitions:

"CONDUCT", in relation to a game of lotto, includes promote, organise and operate.

"RULES", in relation to a game of Lotto, means the rules made by a licensee in relation to games of lotto conducted by him and in force under section 11.

Conditions of licence

- 6.(e) the rules in accordance with which games of lotto shall be conducted by the licensee;
- (i) the amount payable in respect of each entry in or subscription to a game of lotto.
- (1) the attendance at the drawing of each game of lotto of a person nominated by the Minister. (Condition No. 14 of CONDITIONS OF LICENSEE states there-in (AS ADVISED BY A FORMER CHIEF SECRETARY (HON.GARY WEST) IN A LETTER TO ME) "TO BE CONDUCTED AT A PLACE WHERE THE PUBLIC ARE ADMITTED - such is NOT made Public knowledge

Directions to licensees

- 9A. (1) If the Minister is of the opinion that the integrity or apparent integrity of a game or games of lotto conducted by a licensee is likely to be seriously prejudiced:
- (a) by any irregularity or alleged irregularity of any kind; or
- (b) by the character or reputation of any person concerned in the management or supervision of the game or games; or
- (c) by any other fact or circumstances reported to the Minister.

Rules

11.(1) A licensee may make rules, not inconsistent with this Act, the regulations or the conditions of his licence, for or with respect to the conduct by him of games of lotto.

- (2) A rule made pursuant to subsection (1) shall, if it is approved in writing by the Minister

- (a) be published in the Gazette; and
- (b) take effect on and from the date of publication or a later date specified in the rule.

COMMENT: Existing Rules AUGUST 1990 TITLED LOTTO THE BIG ONE - totally obsolete in that "LOTTO THE BIG ONE" is NON EXISTANT and numerous changes have since been put into practice. Thus LOTTO IS CURRENTLY BEING CONDUCTED IN BREACH OF THE LOTTO ACT 1979

Prohibition on promotion of syndicates

12A.(2) A person shall not advertise by any means that he or she will receive money for purchase of a share in an entry in, or subscription to, a game of lotto.

COMMENT: Visits to a number of Newsagents quite explicitly ADVERTISE THEIR SYSTEMS ENTRIES ? EXAMPLES - CABRAMATTA NEWSAGENTS OPPOSITE RLY STATION & ON JOHN STREET.

Oz Lotto redraw confusion

THOUSANDS of Oz Lotto players were last night put in a spin when the machine that randomly chooses the winning numbers broke down, forcing a redraw.

Three numbers in the \$1.2 million game had already been drawn when the machine went into overdrive and spat out more than nine balls at high speed.

The program's host, Kim Sporton, appeared stunned and told viewers draw 287 would have to be cancelled and redrawn off-camera.

But just before the broadcast ended the cameras captured the first drawn numbers — 18, 23, 8, 4, 14 and 27.

About 15 minutes later the redrawn numbers — for which the first prize \$1,240,052.74 will be awarded — were shown at the bottom of viewers' screens.

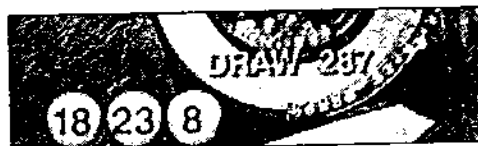
They were 18, 35, 27, 28, 25, 30, with supplementaries 16 and 17.

It is believed to be the first time such an incident has marred Oz Lotto.

A Sydney woman who had the first three drawn numbers on her ticket last night said she was "curious" to find out what the other numbers were.

"They should honour both sets of numbers because it's not fair for the people who had the first lot of numbers — they bought their tickets in good faith," the Bligh Park woman said.

"I have definitely got the first three, I was just agog, I couldn't believe it," she said.

"I was at my local club. I was sitting there writing the numbers on the coaster and it was quite amazing to watch," she said.

"The poor girl doing the draw, her eyes were so wide. She obviously didn't know what was going on."

NSW Lotteries spokesman John Vineburg last night said lottery and Government officials witnessed the draw and it was conducted according to the rules of Oz Lotto.

Mr Vineburg said the rules relating to machine failure and second draws were set out in the terms and conditions of the game for both Lotto and Oz Lotto.

The first draw of Oz Lotto game 284 was declared void after a sensor in the machine failed to register the first three numbers drawn.

The second draw of Oz Lotto game 284 was conducted.

After the first draw, a sensor in the machine failed to register the first three numbers.

Only the first number in the draw, number 18, was recognised by the sensor and remained in a second draw machine.

The correct six numbers — 18, 35, 27, 28, 25 and 30, with supplementaries 16 and 17 — were put to air 15 minutes later.

The \$1,240,052.74 first prize winner of the second draw was Gladys Bonelli, of Western Australia.

Budgeting on toss of a coin

Kerry Chikarovski

It's time for an independent authority to take gaming out of politicians' hands.

THE Productivity Commission's landmark report into the multi-billion dollar gambling industry has highlighted it as one of our most pressing and insidious social problems. The report found that more than 250,000 Australians have serious gambling problems.

The situation is particularly acute in NSW, which is home to 63 per cent of the country's poker machines, and, amazingly, more than 10 per cent of the poker machines in the whole world.

The estimated cost to the nation of gambling problems has reached \$5.2 billion a year. One in four problem gamblers has separated or divorced, and one in 10 has contemplated suicide.

Lawmakers must start tackling gambling addiction in a much more serious and systematic fashion. And the best place to start is by reducing the State Government's growing dependence on — or addiction to — revenue from gambling.

This year's NSW budget shows gambling revenue has skyrocketed to \$1.6 billion — a 50 per cent increase since Labor came to office in 1995. Gambling now accounts for 10 per cent of the State's income.

This is at the very heart of the dilemma. While governments of all political persuasions continue to rely so heavily on gambling to balance the books, there will be no incentive to curtail its growth. Why kill the goose that seems to lay so many golden eggs?

We need to break the link between politicians and gambling by reforming the existing system where politicians and their eager-to-please public servants control most aspects of the industry.

The reform plans the Coalition took to the last State election mirror the key recommendations

and Regulatory Tribunal, which wants an independent gaming authority, effectively removing day-to-day gaming decisions from the political process.

This proposal has now been backed by the Productivity Commission, which wants the key regulatory control body in each State to be independent and have a central role in providing information and policy advice, as well as in administering gambling legislation.

The day-to-day management of gaming policy and regulation should be removed from the minister's office and applied through a consistent process that is continuously fine-tuned through formal consultation with the gaming industry.

The independent gaming authority we propose — a statutory authority responsible directly to Parliament — would subsume the full range of activities of the Casino Control Authority, the gaming functions of the Department of Gaming and Racing, and the gaming sections of the Liquor Administration Board.

The authority would have its own legislation, a board of respected representatives of both the industry and the community, and ministerial involvement would be entirely transparent.

While the Parliament would retain ultimate responsibility for broad policy initiatives, the authority would regulate the number and type of gaming licences in the State — well away from ministerial pressure.

The authority would be able to investigate and report on specific issues relating to gaming, and have an input into how State funds are used to help those with gambling problems.

Applications for poker machines and other gaming facilities would undergo public and transparent consideration, involving a thorough investigation by the authority of the economic and the social impact of any additional licences.

Such a system would merely bring gaming developments into line with all other planning policy in the State. In the long run, it would also contribute to a sustainable, community-based industry.

Establishing an independent gaming authority is a vital starting point. All it requires is the political will on the part of the Premier and his party to join the Coalition in a truly bipartisan effort to tackle the rising tide of gambling addiction.

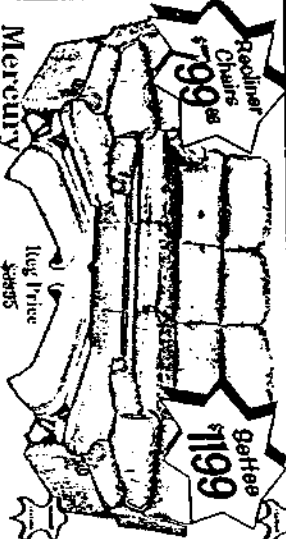

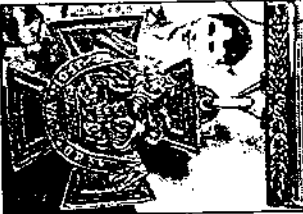

Directions to licensees

- 9A. (1) If the Minister is of the opinion that the integrity or apparent integrity of a game or games of lotto conducted by a licensee is likely to be seriously prejudiced:
- (a) by any irregularity or alleged irregularity of any kind; or
- (b) by the character or reputation of any person concerned in the management or supervision of the game or games; or
- (c) by any other fact or circumstances reported to the Minister.

Rules

11.(1) A licensee may make rules, not inconsistent with this Act, the regulations or the conditions of his licence, for or with respect to the conduct by him of games of lotto.

- (2) A rule made pursuant to subsection (1) shall, if it is approved in writing by the Minister

Odds on that you won't win Powerball

Punters are almost seven times more likely to win Oz Lotto than Powerball, according to a *Choice* survey of lotteries.

The survey has also found that the share of takings returned to punters varies greatly from game to game.

The *Australian Consumers' Association* magazine has rated lotteries in terms of the percentage of takings returned as prizes, and offers tips on choosing "lucky" numbers.

All Tattersalls games pay back 60 per cent of takings, except for the Pools, which pays back 50 per cent.

Keno games return 75 per cent in NSW and Victoria, but gaming machines, including pokies, often pay back 90 per cent.

Choice reports that Powerball rollovers can build up to huge jackpots but your chance of winning is 1 in 55 million.

You have 1 chance in 8 million of winning Oz Lotto, but its top prizes tend to be smaller than Powerball's.

"Our advice would be to only gamble what you're prepared to lose," said *Choice's* Ms Gail Kennedy. "And although there's no such thing as a lucky number ... choosing numbers wisely can minimise the shock of having to share your prize money."

Picking numbers around the edge of the grid can be a good idea, because most people choose numbers in the middle, *Choice* reports.

"Also, though numbers in a sequence — such as 31, 32, 33, 34 — aren't any less likely to come up together than any other set of numbers you choose, most people avoid them ..."

A spokeswoman for the NSW Department for Gaming and Racing said each gaming licence had a minimum return rate, from 60 to 64 per cent, which was monitored by the department each financial year.

\$1.2m just the ticket for lucky 11

A policeman about to celebrate his 46th birthday, a primary schoolteacher and 154 people in a syndicate were among the 11 winning entries in the richer of this week's two Lotto draws.

Four winning entries were unregistered and had yet to claim their \$1.27 million share of the \$14 million first-division prize, a NSW Lotteries spokesman said yesterday. Among the winners of Monday night's sought-after Big One were 154 people from the north-west suburb of Westleigh, who each claimed \$8,200 after paying \$5 towards a Systems 12.

Others to share in the win, besides the Haberfield police officer, were a 39-year-old woman from Wentworthville, a primary schoolteacher, 35, from Penrith, who will now replace her stolen car, a couple from Winston Hills, who will share the money with their three grandchildren, and someone who bought an entry at Warragamba.

The only other winning entry not from metropolitan Sydney was from a 69-year-old retiree in Gulgong, in central western NSW. The four unregistered entries were bought in Randwick, Bondi Junction, Lakemba and Quakers Hill. People spent \$30.2 million on the two draws in this Lotto anniversary week.

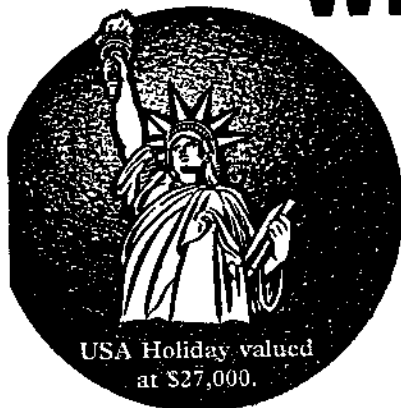

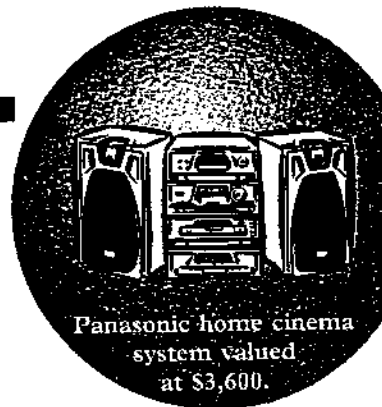

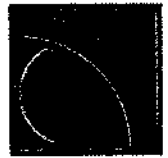

COMPLAINT RE LOTTO AND OZ LOTTO

Thank you for your letter, received at the ABA on 7 August 1995.

The ABA acknowledges your concerns about the programming of "Lotto" and "Oz Lotto" segments on television. However, the issues raised by your letter do not fall within the ABA's jurisdiction, and would more properly be addressed by the Department of Gaming and Racing (contact details as per our previous correspondence).

By way of background, on 5 October 1992 the *Broadcasting Services Act* 1992 (The Act) established the ABA as the regulatory body for the broadcasting industry. The ABA's role is to monitor the broadcasting industry, to provide stable and predictable regulatory arrangements, and to deal with breaches of the rules established under the Act.

In relation to programming issues, the ABA is charged with monitoring licensees' compliance with program standards and with the various industry codes of practice. It should be noted that the Act does not prohibit the broadcast of program material which relates to betting or gambling. The focus of the ABA's regulation lies primarily on the manner in which program material is put to air, rather than the actual subject matter of the program.

It should also be noted that, in this context, "licensee" means the holder of a licence allocated under the Act for commercial television and radio, community television and radio, and subscription broadcasting services.

I have enclosed a copy of the Commercial Television Industry Code of Practice, for your information. This sets out the rules to be followed by television station licensees when scheduling program material for broadcast.

I trust this information is of assistance to you.

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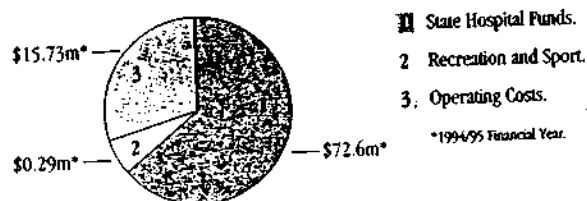

Thank you for your letter of 29 July 1999 outlining your concerns in relation to "games of chance".

I have considered the issues you have raised and appreciate your concerns. However, there does not appear to be a breach of the *Trade Practices Act 1974* ("the Act"). The role of the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission ("the Commission") is to administer the Act. The Commission's objectives are to improve competition and efficiency in markets, as well as to foster adherence to fair trading practices in well-informed markets. It does this through a process of education, as well as enforcement of the provisions of the Act in appropriate circumstances.

I can only confirm the advice given by the NSW Department of Fair Trading. That being, the issues you raise would best be dealt with by the NSW Department of Gaming and Racing. Alternatively, you may consider raising your concerns with your local Minister of Parliament.

I hope this is of some assistance. Thank you for raising this matter with the Commission.

Gaming industry seeks one voice

Leaders in the gaming industry are moving quickly to establish a single body to speak for casinos, clubs and possibly hotels to counter a rising chorus of criticism about the social costs of gambling.

The sense of urgency to establish the industry association was given impetus by a draft report of the Productivity Commission in July which found that Australia had 21 per cent of the world's gaming machines.

The commission provoked a response from a prominent group of what the industry calls "hand-wringers" — including the Prime Minister, who has described gambling as "a social evil" and says he is ashamed of the number of poker machines in Australia.

The new gaming body, probably based in Melbourne, could be established before the end of the year and give the divided industry the single coherent voice it believes it needs to counter its critics.

Industry executives say the commission's figures are flawed. The extent of gaming machines is not as great as the commission has estimated, they say, and

the incidence of problem gaming is not as high as has been claimed.

Key findings of the Productivity Commission relating to the proportion of gaming machines in Australia and the extent of problem gambling have been challenged by Star City Casino and the Australian Hotels Association.

Mr Lance Behan, the public affairs manager for Tattersall's, Victoria, which operates Victoria's lotteries, believes the industry is beset by disinformation.

Ms Tricia Wunch, general manager, corporate affairs, for TABCORP, which is in the process of merging with Sydney's Star City Casino, said the need for a united voice had been discussed for 18 months, and there had been talk before that.

Calls for an industry body are backed by Crown Casino in Melbourne and Burswood Resort casino in Perth, but a spokesperson for the Australian Hotels Association (AHA) said yesterday it had not been decided whether it would participate. Mr Peter Gilgooly, chief general manager of Tattersall's, brought up the subject at a conference of the AHA in NSW in May.

Professor Jan McMillen, president of the Australian Institute for Gambling Research, said gambling was "an important part of our social life and our economy", and the Productivity Commission had "come to terms with the complexity of the industry. But we don't know enough about the industry or its effects".

An industry association would be performing an important function if it did some "genuine research" and brought the results before the public.

"I have been arguing that what we need is collaborative research where they work together on different perspectives," she said.

Mr Laurie Bowe, president of the Council on Problem Gambling, said it was still incumbent on the industry, whether it had a united voice or not, to deal with the question of problem gambling.

That included insisting on smaller hotels and clubs displaying notices informing people suffering from gambling addiction where they could get help. Star City Casino and the larger clubs had done it, but not the smaller venues.

Pokies to show health warnings

ALL 95,000 poker machines in NSW will have to carry cigarette packet style labels warning of the dangers of gambling under new legislation now before State Parliament. The Responsible Gambling Bill, an Australian first, also bans gambling advertising in the electronic media when children are to be most exposed — between 5am and 9am and 3.30pm and 8.30pm.

Just as with cigarette packaging, there will be a choice of warnings such as: "Don't let gambling take control of your life".

Other labels will say "Gambling can become addictive", "Excessive gambling can destroy families and friendships" and "Excessive gambling can lead to the loss of your home".

The signs must be prominently displayed on the front or top of each machine in capital letters 5mm high.

A proposal to feature odds of winning labels for every machine has been dumped.

Instead one sign will cover each group of machines that have the same maximum prize.

Carr backs away from curb on gambling

The rise in the number of poker machines in NSW is likely to continue with the Premier backing away from his push for a cap on gambling.

Mr Carr said yesterday that a cap would drive up the value of existing machines and disadvantage new pubs and clubs.

However, he said a Government working group would continue to examine the issue as part of its response to the Productivity Commission's gaming report.

His comments came as the Government introduced the first stage of its responsible gambling package to Parliament.

New legislation includes restrictions on gambling-related advertising, inducements and the location of ATMs. Clubs and pubs are also required to display details of counselling services.

Draft regulations released for comment yesterday will also require pubs and clubs to advise the odds of winning a jackpot.

Install clocks in gaming areas and put up warnings about the danger of excessive gambling.

After the release in July of the Productivity Commission's draft report, which found NSW had half the nation's 180,000 poker machines and one-tenth of the world's Mr Carr said he wanted a general cap on gambling and was opposed to any increase in the number of machines.

But yesterday he said: "A cap would produce a huge rise in the value of those machines out there. Because we would be advantaging those establishments, pubs and hotels that have already got machines, and disadvantaging any new entrant, for example a club setting up in a growth area."

The number of poker machines in NSW has risen from 62,332 in 1995 to 94,300 in 1998, an increase partly caused by the 1996 decision to allow hotels to have machines.

While pubs are restricted to 40 poker machines there are no statutory restrictions on numbers in registered clubs.

A 12-storey resort and club with 20,000 machines was approved by Liverpool Council last month, despite the opposition of Mr Carr and Government MPs.

The State Opposition yesterday said it supported the measures in the new gambling legislation but claimed it was only a stop-gap measure.

What was required was an independent gaming authority which could decide on whether there should be any increases in poker machines, the Opposition Leader, Mrs Chikarovski, said.

These measures are welcome but they do not address the major issue facing this State which is the incredible expansion of gaming, she said.

The NSW Council of Social Service said it was disappointed with Mr Carr's failure to push ahead with a cap on machines and also establish an independent gaming authority.

The council's director, Mr Gary Moore, said: "NCSS would seek cross-bench and Opposition support for a amendment to the legislation in the Upper House to toughen up its controls on gambling."

He said the new state of affairs would be a disaster.

Mr Carr said the Government would continue to examine the issue as part of its response to the Productivity Commission's gaming report.
