



## RED TAPE IN SMALL BUSINESS: ISSUES AND SOLUTIONS

## **WORKSHOP REPORT**

On 23 September 2009, Gulf Savannah Development and Tablelands Futures Corporation delivered a *Red Tape in Small Business* workshop, in response to repeated complaints about red tape to the Gulf Savannah/ Tablelands Small Business Advisory Service.

A number of small businesses provided written input into the workshop and fifteen people attended the workshop held in Atherton, including:

- the Hon. Jan Jarratt MP, Parliamentary Secretary for Employment, Economic Development and Innovation and Chair of the Queensland Small Business Advisory Council
- Councillors Rhonda Sorenson and Jenny Jensen from the Tablelands Regional Council
- representatives from peak organisations such as Gulf Savannah Development, Tablelands Futures Corporation, and the Mareeba Fruit and Vegetable Producers Association
- representatives from State Departments DEEDI and DERM
- small business owners and managers.

A host of specific examples of red tape were identified by workshop participants. Five recurring, generic red tape issues were then identified:

- inappropriate forms
- lack of information and education for the small business community when new regulations are made
- duplication across different agencies
- 'one-size-fits-all' regulations or over-regulation
- a suite of issues affecting the food industry.

The workshop then proceeded to identify possible solutions to these generic issues.

She thanked participants for their inputs and undertook to take these issues and solutions up within Treasury and to investigate the options for a full review of the situation facing the food industry.
